Mountain HIGH

Deep in the heart of the Dolomites, where Italy meets Austria, a pair of hostelries are showcasing Italy at its peak, says **Farhad Heydari**

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Adige wasn't grabbing too many headlines. A quiet, mountainous province tucked up against Austria's Tyrol, it was renowned locally – and with visiting Germans, Dutch and Swiss – for its clean design, earthy cuisine and rich wines. Then in 2007, a pentad of its eateries were awarded stars by Michelin; today, this uniquely bilingual wedge of the newly UNESCO-crowned Dolomites boasts the most Michelin stars

of any Italian province, vintages that are

San Lorenzo Mountain Lodge, from €900-€2,800, sanlorenzo mountainlodge.it bulging roster of stylish eco-friendly hotels and B&Bs that are speckled in its verdant valleys and on the hillsides of its serrated peaks, shouldn't come as any surprise. The first is San Lorenzo Mountain Lodge: a 16th-century maso, or farmhouse, perched 1,200 metres at the edge of a couloir in the Val Pusteria, above the town of Brunico. The brainchild of Giorgia and Stefano Barbini, the lodge, which sleeps six in three en-suite bedrooms and another four in a rusticated dwelling with a pair of bunks, marries centuries-old charm with mod cons, including an underfloor heating system hidden by the larch and stone. Guests, who must hire the lodge exclusively, have a troika of lounges to call their own, including one anchored by a roaring wood-burning fireplace and >

another by a massive flatscreen TV. To soothe the aches and pains following a day out on the hiking trails that crisscross the 17-hectare estate, there is a state-of-the-art outdoor hydrotherapy pool with jet lane and a petite spa, complete with an indoor whirlpool, a steam room, a sauna fashioned from ancient spruce and an automatically refilling bucket dunk. But the hallmark of the property, which also features a wine cellar and a traditional stube, are its artisanal accessories, like the rabbit and cashmere throws, the loden pillow coverings and the one-off blankets, handmade from wolf and coyote skin.
